

A family welcome in Perth

Norma doesn't leave the house much.

In fact, she has been largely housebound for a while. She has Parkinson's Disease, which means she has trouble eating and talking. It has been a real struggle for Norma, and her deteriorating health and feelings of loneliness have weighed heavy on her.

Despite that, she has shown incredible resilience, even recovering from a coma after serious brain injury.

After receiving a call from Saints in the Community inviting her to their Festive Friends event at McDiarmid Park, Norma was really hesitant to go.

She wasn't used to socialising.

To the surprise of her delighted daughters, Norma did make the trip to the stadium, and we're just as pleased as her daughters that she did.

"I honestly can't find the words to thank you for the phone call inviting Mum to Festive Friends. Never in a million years did I think she would go," one daughter said.

"She doesn't leave the house, so this was a humongous achievement.

"Not only did we get her out of the house, but she listened and joined in conversations, ate a nutritious meal and had fun. These are the basics of everyday life, yet mum hasn't participated in these for many years.

"I am truly humbled by the kindness, attentiveness and utter joy all the staff showed at the Christmas lunch chatting with the invitees. The magic of the Christmas spirit was there in abundance."





A word from our CEO

2024 was a year where many in our communities faced multiple challenges.

However, our network of SPFL associated trusts and clubs (ATCs) tackled them head on, and we were delighted to see them spreading festive joy throughout the country for the whole of December.

We understand the unique role that football plays in Scotland. ATCs within our network are perfectly positioned to create meaningful, positive change.

Festive Friends is a standout initiative in the SPFL Trust's calendar, supported by staff, volunteers, and ATCs across the country. It's about uniting communities and spreading magic during the holiday season.

Over the last nine years, the programme has made an extraordinary impact, providing over 26,000 meals in that time.

In 2024, we reached over 5,200 people living in social isolation, with 37 clubs participating. Stadiums were once more filled with cheer, and Christmas hampers were delivered to those who needed them the most.

Inviting people along to stadiums does more than give them festive joy, however. It's about building connections and opening conversations. ATCs can provide support in many situations, signposting participants to other programmes and local organisations, using a 'No Wrong Door' approach at their stadium.

Our thanks go to the 37 participating ATCs and the wealth of partners who supported the Festive Friends initiative in 2024.







What is Festive Friends?

Festive Friends is a project created and funded by the SPFL Trust and SPFL which aims to engage and support those across our communities who are socially-isolated over the festive period.

Located in the very heart of communities, ATCs are able to tackle social isolation by bringing festive magic and, importantly, companionship to older people who may otherwise face the festive season alone.

ATCs work closely with local strategic partners, such as social work departments and third-sector organisations, to identify older people in need and put plans in place to send some festive cheer their way.

In 2024, participants of Festive Friends were either given a hamper filled with delicious food, festive treats, and fun games, or invited to their local stadium for a traditional Christmas dinner, lively entertainment, thoughtful gifts, and, above all, wonderful company.

He was thrilled not only by the surprise but by the players' kindness in sitting down to chat about the club he loves.

Ronnie told them that more social interaction, getting out the house and getting back to Dens Park would make a huge difference in his life. To his delight, the players arranged tickets for Ronnie to come to a home game this season.

Dundee FC Community Trust are now working with Ronnie to make sure he can get back to doing what he loves in a place that feels like home.

St Mirren FC Charitable Foundation



Ronald recently lost his wife of 50 years, and he has been struggling with grief.

He now lives alone and was referred to St Mirren FC Charitable Foundation by Renfrewshire Council's Sheltered Housing Team due to his isolation.

Two of their event volunteers were deeply moved by his story. After attending Festive Friends, Ronald invited them in for a cup of tea, and they spent over an hour chatting about his wife and his life.

Grateful for the company, Ronald later shared how much he enjoyed his meal - especially the turkey and pigs in blankets - and appreciated his gifts, which fit perfectly.

Motherwell Community Trust

Alan was nominated by his church to attend Festive Friends for the first time this year.



In the later years of his life, he was part of a close-knit trio of friends who enjoyed playing bowls and sharing a pint together.

Tragically, he lost both of his companions in 2024, leaving him feeling down and at a loose end.

When he came to Festive Friends, he quickly embraced the warmth of the event, posing for photos with his new tablemates. It was a heartening and positive conclusion to what had been a challenging year for Alan.

John has recently been housed in the area after a period of homelessness.
